# 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

# 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Established in 1956, Govt. Post Graduate College, Datia is a pioneer institution in Gwalior-Chambal Division. The institute offers the studies at UG / PG level and was conferred with autonomous status in 1995 by UGC. The institution is situated in the holy city of Datia and is housed in one of the palace of Bundela dynasty.

It has lush green lawns with various faculties. Some blocks have been constructed by support of RUSA and other Grants by State Government. With the both the types of architectures viz. old and new, it spreads over a vast campus of 13.22 acres. State Govt. has approved the proposal of the College to be elevated as lead College in Cluster University comprising colleges in the vicinity.

Keeping the demand of society in mind, College administration has decided to start two new certificate courses viz. (i) communicative English and (ii) Taxation. There are facilities of studies in the college in 20 various programs in different faculties. This is the range of these subjects which make the college a unique educational institution in this semi-urban region. There are four recognized research centers viz. Hindi, Sanskrit, Economics and Chemistry which are providing research facilities. Department of Chemistry also has research collaborations.

The College was given excellence status by DHE, MP. At present the College has 42 faculties' regular basis and 20 as guest faculty. The college has over 8000+ students which is second largest in the Gwalior Chambal division. College has also facilitated the students with provisions of canteen, cycle and vehicle stand, girl's common room, library facility, internet and photocopier facilities. College is well equipped with the facilities of washrooms, water coolers equipped with R.O. filtered water. Govt. of M.P. has also sanctioned a post of sports officer who is meant to develop sporting spirit among the students and to conduct sports activities. The college has N.C.C. and N.S.S. units. Following the guidelines of UGC for Divyang persons, the college has constructed ramps. As per instructions of DHE M.P., the College has also established a Vivekanad Rozgaar Prakoshtha.

Our institution should be a premier institute not only in the region; but also in state as well as in nation which serves with excellence to produce well mannered, skilled, educated and research oriented human resource which will be an asset for our country.

# 1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

## **Institutional Strength**

- 1. College is an autonomous College and this status has been granted to the College since 1995.
- 2. Till then College has maintained this status in every review and extension inspection of UGC.
- 3. College is among the list of first 18 Govt. Colleges of DHE which are beneficiaries of RUSA from state.
- 4. College has been accreditated twice by the NAAC by "B" grade in 2006 and in 2013-14 with CGPA 2.71/4.00.
- 5. College is the only premier institution in the region imparting quality education to over 8000+ students in this semi-urban area.
- 6. College has ample infrastructure and learning resources.
- 7. College has 04 recognized research centers by the affiliating university and more than 10 faculties in different subjects/ disciplines are recognized Research Guides at various Universities.
- 8. College has been selected by DHE, Bhopal to serve as lead College in the Cluster University comprising constituent Colleges in the Vicinity of the institution.
- 9. College has ample student support Cells/ Units as 01 unit of NCC, 02 Units of NSS, Vivekanand Rozgaar Prakoshtha, Personality Development Cell etc. with all necessary committees required in this regard.
- 10. College has multilevel library enriched with a large number of books and Journals and e-library facility. Presently working towards its automation with SOUL 3.0 latest version. Member of inflibnet and Delnet.

#### **Institutional Weakness**

- 1. Increasing student's strength is the strength as well as weakness of this College as some times it becomes a problem to cater their needs and to handle them.
- 2. Location of the College is one of its weakness.
- 3. Less number of teaching and non teaching staff is another weakness of this institution.
- 4. Less number of self-financing/ professional courses may be considered as another weakness.
- 5. Approach road / way to the college along with insufficiency of public transport to reach the college may also be taken as it's another weakness.
- 6. Lack of proper canteen and recreation room as well as Gym is another weakness.
- 7. Less number of recognized research centers is another weakness.

#### **Institutional Opportunity**

1. College has opportunity to submit a proposal for elevation in university/ cluster University after accreditation in better grade.

- 2. College has opportunity to start new self- financing courses.
- 3. We have opportunity to open some new vocational courses.
- 4. College has opportunity to increase in the number of faculty members.
- 5. College has opportunity to have more research guides along with more recognized research centers in other subjects too.
- 6. We have an opportunity to have a separate science block.

College has an opportunity to develop recreation center for students.

#### **Institutional Challenge**

- 1. It is a challenge for the college to be a lead college in the group of colleges if it is elevated as Cluster University.
- 2. Apart from introducing new self –financing / vocational courses for the benefits of students in this semi-urban/ rural region, students were reluctant to get admission in these courses.
- 3. DHE, Bhopal can increase the number of posts for regular faculty in the College.

College needs more grants from any source/ funding agency to create/ build separate science block/ recreation centre. College has been given this opportunity by the state Govt. in a sanction for separate science block under world bank funded MPHEQIP scheme

# 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

#### **Curricular Aspects**

Being an Autonomous institute there is a freedom altering / adding 20% syllabus in each and every programme offered by the college. College enjoys this freedom often within the statuary guidelines of affiliating university at postgraduate level. However at undergraduate level DHE constitutes a committee at Central Board of Studies for framing/modification of syllabi for all UG classes. College has organized 02 value added courses for the benefit of students during last 5 years

#### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

Usually Lecturate method has been adopted in the College for teaching and learning process. Apart from this traditional method Seminars / Presentations at PG level are also in practice. Being autonomous Government College, modes suggested by the DHE, Bhopal as well as the guidelines of affiliating university for CCE and continuous evaluation and examination process are adopted. During the period of CORONA pandemic, as per the need of time online classes are being conducted to achieve the purpose of continuous learning and the e-content, video lectures, PPT presentations, audio recordings are also uploaded on the college website as well as website of DHE, M.P. for the larger benefit of the students. #### Research, Innovations and Extension

College has 04 recognized research centers affiliated to Jiwaji university Gwalior viz. Hindi, Sanskrit, Economics and Chemistry. At present 29 research scholars are enrolled and working for their Ph.D. At present 13 teachers are recognized research guides in different subjects/ disciplines. In some fields like Astro-Physics, Theoretical Chemistry, Simulation etc. Some innovations are being done by the learned faculty of the College. Principal of our College is also engaged in guiding research in the subject of his own expertice.

College is publishing a Research Journal viz. "Research Spectrum- A Multi- Faculty Research Journal" with ISSN number since 2015-16.

Some of the Faculty members in the science faculty have appreciable bibliometeric data viz. Citations/ h-Index/ i 10 index etc. They have been included in the global data bases like Google scholar/ scopus/ orcid/ researchgate etc.

# **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

There is ample infrastructure in the College in all respects with sufficient learning resources in each faculty for catering the needs of the students. College is providing quality education using these resources and utilizing this infrastructure. This is reflected in the enhanced number of student strength every year.

#### **Student Support and Progression**

There are 01 unit of NCC, 02 Units of NSS, Vivekanand Rozgar Prakoshth, Personality development cell, student trekking system, Library with a large number of books, e- library facility and all necessary statuary committees for the student support. Because of this fact and due to quality of education with bright results every year, student progression may be assessed with the parameter of increasing strength every year.

College organizes "career avsar mela" for the benefit of students every year and some of the students get their placements through these melas / fairs

### Governance, Leadership and Management

College is abide to follow the rules and regulations laid by DHE .M.P., Bhopal, with all statuary bodies like UGC, RUSA etc. and affiliating University. College has Jan Bhagidari Samiti also which looks after its progress and need based requirement in thrust areas at local level. College is scaling heights under the able guidance of the Principals who have posted here time to time.

College manages the administrative works through the various committees which are formed by the Principal every year. Details of which along with the organogram of hirearchy is mentioned in the description of criteria at appropriate place.

#### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

# 2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

#### **Response:**

Yes, the institution assesses the learning levels of the students after admission. This is done through continuous comprehensive evaluation viz. CCE. There are 14 modes suggested by the Department of Higher Education Govt. Of M.P. for CCE. Students are also given a chance of improvement in their performance through different mode.

For slow learners there is a provision for remedial classes which are organized along with the remedial classes of special/ reserved category students. These classes are being conducted under World Bank project this year. These remedial classes help in the catering the need of slow lerners and to give them pace with others. Records of these classes are kept with the incharge and respective departments who organized these classes.

In case of advanced learners, seminars are being conducted in which they deliver lectures in their respective classes. Examination procedures adopted is as follows:

- (1) Examinations are being conducted timely according to the annual academic calendar issued by the D.H.E. Govt. Of M.P. Bhopal. Now, there is annual pattern at UG and semester pattern at PG level.
- (2) Examination cell / committee including the Principal as chief examination controller bears the responsibility for safe and smooth conduction of examinations. For smooth conduction of activities of examination cell there are 10 teachers are included this cell.
- (3) Students are well informed with ample time as preparation leave. At the time of examinations conduction team is being constituted by the order of the Principal along with the flying squad to ensure hassle free and smooth conduction of examinations.
- (4) Processes integrating IT: Use of IT techniques are there in
- (i) making cross-lists,
- (ii) generating exam forms,
- (iii) submission of examination fee by the students,
- (iv) generating exam roll numbers,
- (v) posting marks obtained in each paper/ subject and making results of the examinations.
- (vi) generating mark lists

The entire examination process including the form filling fee deposition and other process are conducted through online mode. Generation of mark- lists and other exam related records are stored digitally in our data base.

We are conducting a transparent, totally online complain and grivaences cell named CM help line where (ph. no. 181) which is toll free and can be accecced 24x7 throughout the year by the student, faculty, employees, gaurdians and other stake-holders. Here we have a time bound resolution of all received

genuine complaints with channel/ levels. The complainer is free to talk the additional director, commissioner and other higher authorities, if he is not convienced with the type of solution given to his complaints.

This confidential work is being done by a nodal agency confidentially which is hired by the college. Some specific softwares are in use for the purpose of preparation of results.

Continuous internal assessment system:

- (i) Continuous comprehensive evaluation CCE system for the students pursuing their studies at P.G. level is being carried out adopting any one of the fourteen methods suggested by the State Govt. i.e. D.H.E. Govt. Of M.P. as there is semester system adopted for these classes.
- (ii) Internal assessment is being conducted for the students at UG level as their studies are in annual pattern. CCE are being conducted by the department itself and their marks are dispatched confidentially to the autonomous cell and in case of internal assessmentfor students at UG level, these are conducted as examinations for them. Autonomous cell which is headed by the exam controller bears the responsibility for smooth conduction of exams, maintaining records and declaration of results timely.

Results are being uploaded on the college website class wise for easy access for students. Marks- lists of the students are also being downloaded from internet .

Certified internet downloaded marklists are also applicable for the purpose of admission in new class. Project undertaken by the students is also the part of evaluation of students. Some of the selected projects are also uploaded in the college website.

For smooth conduction of examination pattern we have consulted an authorized State Bank of India and MP online Koisk for the purpose of depositing the fees for respective work, Issueing TC to the student and other formalities like issueing the duplicate marksheets and degrees.

#### 6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

#### **Response:**

Yes, institution has the functional IQAC. IQAC has send the AQAR's to NAAC every year. This body holds its periodic meetings as per the guidelines laid down by the NAAC.

Two best practices which are institutionalized and which significantly contributed for the quality assurance strategies are :

- 1. Recording the feedbacks from every stakeholders, so far as possible. In maintaining this practice, IQAC record the feedbacks from students and faculty in a definite interval of time which is then analyzed critically and shared with teachers, librarian, sports officer and Principal as per need. Action has also been taken on this feedback.
- 2.IQAC is actively involved in organizing and promoting academic and other related activities for the improvement of quality. These may involve organizing lecture series of different subjects, organising seminars or workshops time to time in collaboration with autonomous cell of the college.
- 3.On the recommendation of IQAC, college has started its own research publication A research

Journal It is research Journal with ISSN number which is being published almost regularly.

- 4.On the recommendation of IQAC, and with due permission of academic council and finance committee, Autonomous cell of the College has started giving research support to the teachers in the form of Micro research projects and supporting teachers with T.A. and registration fee for participating and presentation in research seminars.
- 5.On the recommandation of IQAC autonomous cell of the College also funds for organizing workshops/ seminars/ webinars etc. Making use of this facility zoology department has organized one international webinar during first lockdown period, May 2020, last year.

6.5.2 The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms and recorded the incremental improvement in various activities ( For first cycle - Incremental improvements made for the preceding five years with regard to quality For second and subsequent cycles - Incremental improvements made for the preceding five years with regard to quality and post accreditation quality initiatives )

#### **Response:**

Yes, it is carried out by recording feedback from the stakeholder's viz. Students and teachers. It is one of the process by which institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures and methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and it is the responsibility of IQAC.

IQAC also has its role in calculation of A/R score of the teachers every year. This is another method by which review of individual's effeort for teaching learning process which is being carried out.

So, far as year wise increamental improvements are concerned, following steps are note-worthy:-

- 1. Publication of a multi-faculty Research Journal viz. "Research- Spectrum- A Multifaculty Research Journal" by the institution with ISSN number since 2015 onwards.
- 2.Set-up of Virtual Class room which is functional and is in operation since 2015-16.
- 3. Set-up of smart classes in the institution since 2016-17 for better learning outcome
- 4. Upliftment of library as multi-level library with facility of e-books, journals etc. for better learning outcome
- 5. Upliftment of infrastructure as class rooms from the grants obtained by RUSA, DHE MP and other agencies

- 2. Objectives of the Practice Objective of this Best practice is for the better understanding of the subject and better progression of the students to shape responsible citizens for tomorrow.
- 3. The Context- In this context some challenges are there which are to be faced by the institution viz. (i) Rural Background of the students (ii) Less understanding of the students in English etc. but college is trying its level best to meet those challenges and to cater the needs of the students of this semi-urban area- Bundelkhand region.
- 4. The Practice- Being Govt. College, we have a limitation to follow the syllabus as designed by the central board of studies, department of higher education Bhopal.

This is an autonomous college also therefore, as per UGC guidelines the college has a freedom to alter 20% of the curricula depending upon the requirements of local needs.

The college is trying its level best to cater the needs of the students (i) by overcoming the challenges mentioned above through remedial classes (ii) by arranging and providing notes for the students related to the curriculum. College is doing this practice following the norms and regulations as laid by the UGC and state Govt.

- 5. Evidence of Success- This practice definitely provide a better learning environment for the students pursuing their studies in the College. as evident from the success rate of the students in different courses is very appreciable every year.
- 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required- Staff of the college is firm to give its best to the students so far as basic work i.e. teaching and learning is concerned.

#### **IInd Best Practice:**

- 1. Title of the Practice Best practice in the promotion of research
- 2. Objectives of the Practice- The College is willing to be a rising star in the field of research also in this semi-urban region of Bundelkhand to cater the needs of the students in research who have to be dependent on nearby areas like Jhansi/ Gwalior to fulfill their needs for doing research and we are trying to scale the heights in this context also.
- 3. The Context- College is the only premier institution in this region. It provides and fulfills the needs of students in different subjects with post-graduation in facilities in 12 subjects, out of which only 03 subjects viz. Hindi, Economics and Sanskrit were the recognized research centers of the affiliating university till last inspection of NAAC (IInd Cycle). Now, we have 04 recognized research centres viz. Hindi, Economics, Sanskrit and Chemistry. We wish to develop some more new research centers to caters the needs of the students as it is the second largest college in Gwalior Chambal division of M.P. so far as student's strength is concern. We are also interested to provide a plate-form to research workers for the publication of their work.
- 4. The Practice- The faculty of the College has tried a lot in this regard to fulfill this best practice as it is evident from the no of research papers by the learned faculty of the college. On an average ~7 -8 research papers are there per faculty member in our college.

A few faculty members have a total of high impact factor of their published research papers in referred peer reviewed journals. Some of the faculty members are also enjoying as resource persons in different seminars/ conferences etc. Some of the faculty members have also participated in international seminars/ conferences.

Names of some of the faculty members are also included in international databases such as SCOPUS etc. with appreciable impact factor/ citations/h-index/ i-10 index etc. A few Faculty members are also the members of editorial boards of different journals. All these faculty members are recognized guides/ supervisors in their respective fields/ subjects and we are also trying to increase this number, in order to achieve the objectives mentioned above.

Four departments of the college are recognized research centers of the affiliating university as mentioned above in the section "Context" and two more have applied for it. This is again a cumulative effort of the faculty to achieve the objective mentioned above.

College is also publishing its own multi-faculty research journal viz. "Research Spectrum" almost regularly which is having ISSN number. This is a step ahead in comparison to the previous NAAC inspection (IInd cycle). We have a plan to make it a journal with valid and appreciable impact factor which would be included in the UGC –Care list.

All these efforts by the learned faculty of the college may be included as the best practice in this regard.

5. Evidence of Success- A lot of contribution by the learned faculty of the college in various aspects

viz. publishing research papers, participating in seminars and conferences, completing their research projects, their research in collaborative manner with other organizations/ institutes, their contribution in editorial boards of various research journal and other related works done by them is the evidence of the success of the faculty to meet with this best practice.

DHE, Government of M.P. had given status of lead to monitor the five Government colleges and all

private colleges in the district. College has also been given the status of College of Excellence by DHE, govt. of M.P.

Institution has been organizing the sports activities at district as well division level in chess, kabaddi, cricket, athletics etc. and had been center of attraction for students of this institution and other affiliated institutions also. There are many achievements which may be cited with pride in this regard.

College is also leading with the fact that it possesses the best infrastructure not only in the district but also in the division. On looking on the fulfillment of criteria and conditions laid down by MHRD, the college was among the one in the first 18 colleges of the state who have obtained grants in component 7 by RUSA.

Institution have highly qualified teaching faculty in in various faculties viz. science. Arts, commerce and law who are imparting the education by adopting the best teaching practices suitable to cater the needs of the Students as it is evident from the results of the examinations.

Every year institute is producing nearly 700 well qualified postgraduate students in different subjects of various faculties' viz. arts, science and commerce. They are aspiring of placements in Govt. as well as in private sector and some are entrepreneurs who have worked in the establishment of small scale industries, services industries and consultation services etc.

It is a matter of pride to state that institution is a recognized study center of IGNOU in which nearly 2000 students are registered for different courses. This facility is available only in this college so far as division level is concern. This study center is a point of attraction among students.

The institution is unique in the sense that it has a seat of higher learning of regional language of Bundelkhand viz. BundelibhashaPrakoshth where scholars of this regional language are participating in the different programmes organized by this prakoshth time to time. This is managed by the Hindi department of the College at present.

The college is also unique in the sense that we are regularly publishing our multi-faculty research journal viz. "Research Spectrum" for the last three years or so. This journal is having ISSN number allotted to it. This activity is specific in the division.

College has its distinctiveness in the field of research also as we have 04 recognized research centers and we have a plan to increase this number. In this context, it is a note- worthy to mention that over 40% of the teaching staff of the college is recognized research supervisors in different subjects. We have a plan to increase this number also as it is one of the best practice mentioned by the institution.

The institution has its distinctiveness in the field of working in environment consciousness as ECO-CLUB of the college has been appreciated at state as well as at National level.

Other point to mention that institute has a well-furnished and equipped central multi-level library with modern adequate facilities accessible to every student. This library has its reputation in the division.

College has functional and registered alumni. This is another distinctiveness of our institution.

Last but not the least, it is worthy to mention here as one of the distinctiveness of the college that this institution has been assigned by the status of autonomy by UGC in the year 1995 which had been maintain till today as per UGC guidelines and norms.
